The Reredos Behind the High Altar in the quire, Sir Ninian Comper's remarkable reredos is the Cathedral's war memorial.

The statues represent kings, queens and saints associated with the North of England. Above them is an unusual statue of a beardless Christ with short hair.



St Wilfrid built his amazing Crypt in 672AD, making it the oldest surviving Anglo-Saxon crypt in Descend the steep steps to go back in time and experience this ancient chapel. Less than ten feet high and seven feet wide, the Crypt is one of England's very first stone churches and the oldest to have been in continuous



Misericords

Of special interest and charm are the carved medieval misericords which decorate the choir stalls.





The Library and Treasury

The Library was built above the Chapter House in the early 14th century. Today it houses the Cathedral's Treasury and the

famous 7th Century Ripon Jewel and Anglo-Saxon stones.

The Library also contains a collection of 'Long Gallery' portraits depicting Kings and Queens of the 15th and 16th centuries. These were probably painted during the reign of James I (1603–1625)
